time. As a result, renovations or adaptations for accessibility are increasingly becoming common to provide home and commercial safety solutions.

The core of the RLC provides a simulated living space using universal design principles. It showcases the possibilities of having a barrier free home that is functional and aesthetically pleasing.

Access from the first floor to the second is via a staircase that meets the built environment AODA standards, a portable stair track or a LULA Glass elevator.

A variety of products and well appointed rooms showcase accessibility options including barrier free bathing/showering fixtures, adjustable height kitchen work surfaces/cabinetry and many others products not yet commonly available in Canada.

The ReliAble Living Centre also houses a training facility to educate building trades’ people, healthcare professionals and the public about accessibility standards and more.

I have collaborated on a variety of projects with both Ronny and Daniel. In addition to providing me

with knowledge about specific products appropriate for the families I work with. Ronny also offers an additional valuable service. He provides an inspection for house or condo purchasers to ensure the potential modifications can actually be made – and at what cost. His insight is key to providing my clients with the right information to help them make a decision on choosing the perfect home or condo for their situation.
